## **HSMC Local History Photograph Collection**

We're making our way through our latest collection of photographs from the Historical Society of Martin County. This collection has featured some very rare and interesting images. This last month, we've uploaded items from binders marked "People," filled with portraits of people from all walks of life. We've also tried to research some basic histories of the individuals to accompany the images.

Children surround William Louis Bartling (1867-1958) at a party for his 91st birthday. Bartling claimed he was shipwrecked near the House of Refuge in about 1903. While he lived in several places afterward, including Jensen Beach, by 1954 he had lived in a shack near the Gilbert's Bar House of Refuge so long, he was considered a fixture. When the county purchased the lifesaving station from the U.S. Coast Guard in 1954, one of the agreements was that the county take care of Bartling, and he was allowed to continue to live in his shack near the House of Refuge land. He died in a fire in 1958.

E. A. Menninger owned the Stuart News (originally the Stuart Daily News) from 1928 to 1958. Menninger earned the moniker "Flowering Tree Man" after writing many books and articles about tropical and subtropical flowering trees and vines. Menninger was the driving force behind the creation of many of the public parks in our area, including Stuart's Memorial Park and Jonathan Dickinson State Park.



Myrtle Mabel Dyer (1900-1992) at the annual meeting of the Early Settlers of Lower Indian River meeting. Dyer was a graduate of FSU and Palmer College of Chiropractic. She took over Dyer's Dry Goods (established 1914) in 1925 and managed it until 1980, when it closed.


County Schools for almost 40 years.

Included in this collection are copies of the Martin County High School newspaper *The Southwind*, from the late 1940s through the early 1960s.


